# COALTION FIELD TRIP FOR JUNE 2006 By Betty Deming

The Rimstones Rock Club will again this year lead a trip up to the area north of Payson to hunt for a variety of fossils, geodes/nodules and petrified corals.

The plan has not been written up, but, like last year, we will meet in Payson, probably at around 9:00 a.m. on Saturday June 24. Our usual meeting spot is at the intersection of Highway 87 & 260, NE corner behind Taco Bell.

There will be a sign-up table so everyone can sign the waiver of liability for the trip, a short presentation/explanation of the trip and what materials will be picked up, and a handout with maps and locations.

The caravan will leave about 9:30 a.m. and proceed via North Highway 87 to Houston Mesa Road and out to the fossil hunting areas. The trip will include stops at two different areas and for those willing to continue on, a third area to hunt for the following:

- Payson Geodes
- Fossilized Corals and Crinoids
- The new fossil hunting area along Highway 260 just West of Kohl's Ranch

We will have club members leading the hunt and the names of these people will be sent to you via Terry Worman (<a href="mailto:terry.worman@bull.com">terry.worman@bull.com</a>).

The maps and specifics on the hunting areas will be available at the meeting site on June 24. Last year the trip for fossils was very successful, and we had over 40 people here from different clubs and the caravan was more than 17 cars.

Many Rockhounders are familiar with the fossils available in this area and have hunted them extensively. They are listed in *Gemstones of Arizona*, and Neil R. Bearce's book, *Minerals, Fossils, and Fluorescence of Arizona*, as well as other publications.

We look forward to seeing you and others here on June 24. Mark it on your calendar and plan on attending.

The MSA Board meeting resulted in several proposed significant changes in the future direction of the MSA.

- First, the MSA no longer will co-host the 2007 Arizona Rockfest, but will "participate" and also at the Mineral Museum Family Day events.
- Second, starting on September 12, the second Tuesday of the month, MSA will hold its regular monthly meetings, rather than on the second Friday of each month. So mark your calendars now before you forget and show up three days late and a dollar short!

- Third, MSA will work to strengthen its Field Trip Program.
- Fourth, MSA will work to strengthen its monthly Meeting Programs.

Following tonight's program there was a Members Only drawing and refreshments courtesy of several volunteer cookie cutters, whose efforts we all greatly appreciate. Thank you!

Johanes Koernielus "K.J." Werner joined MSA about a year ago and tonight, for our program, took us, his audience, on a virtual tour and travelogue for seven weeks and 11,000 miles through western Canada and eastern Alaska. Originally he hailed from Vienna, Austria, where he studied geology until age 20, when he emigrated to the U.S. He earned several university degrees and moved to Arizona from southern California in 1996. In California he belonged to several hobbyrelated clubs: the Mineral Society of Santa Monica; Oxnard Club; Santa Barbara Club.

He was the President and Bulletin Editor of the Ventura Club and took Editor awards in the C.F.M. (California Federation) and A.F.M.S. (American Federation of Mineralogical Societies) competitions in 1994 in both California and Boise, Idaho, that year. He lived in Tucson and belonged to the Tucson Gem & Mineral Society and was active with its Annual Show before moving up to Phoenix after a seven-year sojourn in our sister city to the south.

In California K.J. belonged to several hobby-related clubs: the Mineral Society of Santa Monica; Oxnard Club; Santa Barbara Club. He was the President and Bulletin Editor of the Ventura Club and took Editor awards in the C.F.M. and A.F.M.S. competitions in 1994 in both California and Boise, Idaho, that year. He lived in Tucson and belonged to the Tucson Gem & Mineral Society and was active with its Annual Show before moving up to Phoenix after a seven-year sojourn in our sister city to the south.

K.J.'s traveloque was accompanied by trip slides and examples of field-collected, purchased, and bartered-for specimens. The tour departed the USA/Canadian border from Interstate Hwy. 5, thence in Canadian provinces of British Columbia and Road No. 1, Queen Elizabeth Highway, to the Alaska Highway's 1,600 mile-long ribbon completed in 1996, to White Horse, Yukon Territory; Steward's Crossing; NW to Fairbanks; west to Mt. McKinley and Denali National Park; thence south to Wrangle National Forest and St. Elias Mts.; port of Valdez; and return via St. George in northern Rocky Mountains and Lake Louise and Jasper International Peace Park, Canada. Among the sights, we visited the Cariboo Jade Shoppe at MP-150 on Cariboo Hwy; Chasm; the Steward Museum 1825 USA-Russian Treaty site; Caspia & Caspia Asbestos Mine; Yukon Rock Shop; Mac Bride Museum in White Horse copper belt, from which came Wallastonite on city dumps, bornite, iron pyrite and "Plume Agate." Keno City Mining Museum; Moose Creek; City of Dawson gold rush site; St. Elias Mts.; Klaum Museum; Fairbanks Museum; Kobuk Valley Jade Shop; Earthquake Park; Jonesville Mine fossil beds; Wrangle Mts. National Forest; McCarthy Kennecott Mine; Emerald Lake; Chetwyno Gensing Gardens for a Chinese "picker-upper" and then home. Thanks for the armchair tour, "K.J." It was fun.

# Board of Governors Meeting Minutes - May 6, 2006

The meeting was called to order by Gilbert Flores, Jr. The Board of Governors had their first meeting of 2006 on Saturday, May 6, 2006, at the Museum. In attendance were Lois Splendoria, Bob Holm, Lynne and Terry Dyer, K.J. Werner, Sally Fiske, Shirley Fiske, and Gilbert Flores.

Treasurer's Report - Sally distributed an MSA Budget Worksheet, copies of the contractual agreement between Specialty Productions and MSA for 2006, a Statement of Income and Expense for the 2006 Arizona Rockfest show, and the 2005 Annual Financial Report. Gilbert asked Sally to list the income from the CD's as Assets, rather than Income. She reported that the income from dues for 2006 is going to be way down from last year, since only 63 people have paid to date. K.J. asked about ways that we could generate income at our monthly meetings, and discussion followed about this. Lois said that the club should have a booth at the 2007 Flagg Gem and Mineral Show because it is a good venue at which to have our Roulette Wheel.

**Budget Planning for 2006** – The 2005 Statement of Income and Expense was analyzed to ascertain estimated amounts for 2006. The notes from the specific discussion on this will be distributed to the Board members by mail.

Participation in October 2006 Museum Family Day — Shirley said that our club should have a presence in the Family Day activities. She and Sally suggested some type of fish pond game for the children. Much discussion followed on various ideas for this activity. Terry suggested bringing this subject up to the general membership to get ideas for things to do on Family Day. Shirley suggested that Gilbert establish a Family Day Committee, and Shirley and Lois Splendoria volunteered to be on the committee.

**2007 Rockfest** – Our club has fulfilled its current contractual obligation to the Rockfest show. Gilbert suggested that we not participate in the 2007 show. Sally said that she felt the club

should not be a sponsor of the show, but possibly just have a table or booth at the 2007 show. She pointed out that the club needs to be revitalized with other activities. Other members of the board also reinforced this mindset. Terry Dyer moved that we no longer have a show, seconded by Sally Fiske and passed unanimously.

**Speaker Problems at the Meetings** – Lois read a note that one of the members had sent her recently, expressing their disappointment with the lack of structured programs at the meetings this year. She also made the observation that by now the members are coming to the meeting with the expectation of not having a program. The Board discussed the situation of whether we will have a Vice President and Program Chairman for the rest of 2006. Shirley asked Gilbert to talk to WR to see what he wants to do as far as his commitment for the rest of the year, and Gilbert said he was planning to ask WR to resign. Shirley suggested that a Program Chairman be appointed for the rest of 2006.

**Alternate Meeting Night** – K.J. suggested that we consider another night for the general meeting. Shirley said that the club has surveyed the membership in the past to get their input on nights that would work. Lois reminded everyone that we needed to look at the Museum's calendar for the classroom's availability during the month. After looking at the calendar, several possibilities the third Thursday of the were considered: month and the second Tuesday of the month. Lois suggested trying another night, such as the third Thursday of the month starting in the Fall of 2006, to see if it would be a better night for the members and if more people would attend our meetings. Gilbert will talk to the Front Desk to see what night would work the best.

**Delegates for the Rocky Mountain Federation Show** – Since none of our members are planning to attend, it was decided to empower the Arizona State Director, Debbie Leschner, and the Arizona State Assistant Director, Bill Morrow, to vote on our club's behalf.

Next Board Meeting – The next meeting will be Saturday, June 10, at 12 noon at the Museum.

Dear Mr. Russ:

The Board of Governors for the Mineralogical Society of Arizona (MSA) met on May 6, 2006, to discuss the issues pertaining to the operation of the club and the associated activities, most especially the club's ability to operate as a host club for Rockfest.

As far back as 1992, we (the MSA Board) have dealt with lengthy discussions about the dwindling membership and the resulting lessening in support to operate a gem and mineral show. The MSA had attempted to manage the future operation of gem shows by partnering with other clubs and/or promoters. We in the MSA have all benefited greatly from your expertise in the organization and promotion of the Rockfest Gem and Mineral Show.

The members of the board and I have reviewed all possible avenues of continuing as the host club, realizing that few future opportunities exist for us to host our own show. I regret that our organization has been too limited in its ability to maintain its obligations, which has lead to a decision to withdraw from the partnership as the host club for Rockfest.

The Mineralogical Society of Arizona does hereby relinquish all ownership, licensing and marketing relationship to the Rockfest name. The MSA maintains its rights to host a gem and mineral show, but will not seek a date that will in any way conflict with the dates chosen for Rockfest. The MSA maintains that no opinion or action will be instituted in the choice of any and all future organizations with whom Specialty Productions chooses to enter into a partnership with Rockfest events held into the future.

By no means should this decision be a reflection on Specialty Productions or you. You, as the head of Specialty Productions, have always maintained yourself as a vigorous and diligent partner in this relationship.

These decisions are and will be very difficult for many members of the MSA but are a necessity. We find ourselves in the MSA to be victims of societal change, with few members having enough time to spare for an operation of this magnitude. We cannot provide the required manpower, even in the limited role that we play in being considered the "Host Club."

We are extremely interested in taking a participant role in Rockfest and in having the Roulette Wheel as our activity. As such, we will be at your discretion for choosing the placement of our booth in the event.

We look forward to the continued success of Rockfest and wish you the best in your promotion of this quality event.
